Most home burglaries are opportunistic. The potential crook is looking for an easy, low-risk way to get hold of something that's highly valuable and they can quickly sell for cash.

In other words – if they see a chance, they'll take a chance.

If a property looks too difficult to break in to or the thief thinks they might be seen, they're more likely to move on.



Making your home secure

There are simple things we can all do to prevent being the victim of crime. It's called "target hardening", which, in layman's terms, is strengthening your property to protect it from intruders. By planning ahead and taking same simple actions in and around your home, you can substantially reduce the risk of intruders breaking into your home and stealing your valuables.

Some of these initiatives can be retrofitted to an existing home – such as installing better quality locks on your doors and windows, investing in a more secure letterbox or fitting motion sensor lights over your front and back doors. And simple things like keeping trees, shrubs and fences low, so that neighbours can easily see if there's a potential intruder in your front yard, don't cost much.

Before you build

If you're planning to build your own home, there are some tactics and upgrades that you can embed in the build that will reinforce and secure your home long into the future.
